Boating Destination

Cruising The Great Lakes - 3rd in a Series: Lake Huron

As profiled in the last two issues (first as an overview and then with specific coverage of Lake Michigan), there may be no better freshwater boating in the world than in the Great Lakes region. Both veteran and beginner boaters may be surprised to learn that, taken together, the Great Lakes comprise the largest body of freshwater in the world.

Lake Huron (along

with Georgian Bay and the North Channel), offers some of the most varied boating opportunities in the Great Lakes region. From the charms of Mackinac Island and Mackinaw City to the quiet coves of Georgian Bay and the North Channel, this is Great Lakes boating at its best. In fact, Mackinaw City and Mackinac Island are great places to start a tour of this region, with the big bridge that crosses the Straits of Mackinac separating northern Lake Michigan from Lake Huron.

Mackinac Island is the main Lake Huron destination for many boaters (and lots of tourists). The island is only eight miles in circumference and is circled by an extension of Huron Street (great for a bike tour). Highlights include the famed and sprawling Grand Hotel, a quaint downtown area, shopping, and historic Fort Mackinac. Bustling

Mackinac Island State Dock, 906-847-3561, is especially popular so book dockage early.

Mackinaw City recently underwent a \$25 million renovation, with more than 200 shops, an 850-seat entertainment complex, a five-screen cinema, the restored Colonial Michilimackinac State Park, Mackinac Bridge Museum, and trolley service (everything is also generally within walking distance of the marina). Mackinaw City Municipal

Marina, 231-436-5269, also has more than \$400,000 worth of work, with new restrooms, showers, a chart room, and office (they're typically open 24 hours a day in July and August).

To the south, Cheboygan (five marinas) is another popular destination or boating base. This gateway to the Straits of Mackinac features the 100-year-old tower of the Crib Light lighthouse, the 1877 Opera House, great golf, and *Mackinaw*, a Coast Guard ice breaker often available for tours. The 40-mile Inland Waterway connects

Cheboygan with Petoskey and Lake Michigan.

Further south, the western shore of Lake Huron includes many small towns and marinas ideal for daytrips and more. Some top picks are: Rogers City (with a centerpiece rehabbed marina, 517-734-3808); Presque Isle (featuring the only natural harbor on the Michigan shore of Lake Huron), Presque Isle Marina, 517-595-3069; Harrisville (home to one of the few one-room schools still standing in Michigan), Harrisville Harbor of Refuge, 517-724-5242; Oscoda/

Clean Boating - How Are We Doing?

America's first serious legislative attempt to clean up our act on the nation's ponds, lakes, and waterways was enacted into law in 1972. The goal of the Clean Water Act and subsequent legislation has been to protect our drinking water, wildlife, and recreational resources, and to make these waters fishable and swimable by the turn of the

Back in 1972, many lakes and rivers were so badly polluted by uncontrolled sewage discharge and septic run-off that fecal bacteria were counted in the millions per gallon. Many New England rivers were the color of whatever dye was being used in the local textile mills that day. In

Cleveland, Ohio, the Cuyahoga River had actually caught fire from the ignition of industrial discharges floating on the surface.

So, how are we doing? Well, we have been very successful in reducing or eliminating point source discharges from sewage plants, industrial sites, and other institutional sources of pollution. We can now boat, fish and swim in many of those waters without fear of poison or disease. Even the once infamous harbor area where the Cuyahoga River meets Lake Erie is now bustling with pleasure boaters and tourists. As the song goes, we really have changed the world - or at least part of

Au Sable, four marinas, (where the Paul Bunyan tales started); Tawas City, three marinas, (be sure to visit nearby and quaint East Tawas); Bay City, five marinas, (a revived music mecca); Caseville, six marinas, (a resort town with many festivals); Port Austin, three marinas, (near interesting Grindstone City and Port Hope); Harbor Beach,

two marinas, (the nation's largest manmade harbor); Port Sanilac, two marinas, (great wreck diving); Lexington, two marinas; and Port Huron, eight marinas, (sister city with Sarnia, Ontario, Canada to the east).

On the Ontario, Canada, side of Lake Huron, there are many more scenic stopovers. Some of the best include: Port Franks, four marinas, (great cruising along a sandy

shoreline); Grand Bend, two marinas, (a rustic and tranquil town of about 1,000); Bayfield, three marinas, (an artsy little stopover); Goderich, three marinas, (featuring Victorian homes); Kincardine, Kincardine Yacht Club Marina, 519-797-2817, (be sure to visit the historic Kincardine Lighthouse Museum); Port Elgin, Port Elgin Harbour, 519-832-6535, (with sugar maples and great sunsets); historic Southampton, Southampton Marine Motor Lodge, 519-797-2817, (including the Bruce County Museum & Archives); the west coast of the Bruce Peninsula, six marinas; the old fishing village of South Baymouth, South Bay Marina, 705-859-3656; and, back in Michigan, Cedarville, two marinas; Hessel, two marinas; and St. Ignace, St. Ignace Public Dock 906-643-8131.

With the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA), customs generally isn't an issue for boaters. The general rule is that you have

up to 24 hours upon entering the country to check in with customs. Canada has made it easy for boaters entering the country with the Canpass-Private boats system (for details, call 888-CANPASS or the U.S. INS office at 800-375-5283)

Along with charts (see below), the best way to

stay safe and happy while boating in the Great Lakes is with Lakeland Boating's Ports O' Call cruising guides. They remain the most comprehensive full-color resources on the market. But nonpoint sources of pollution - including agricultural runoff, tainted stormwater, near-shore septic tanks, and mobile sources such as boats - are another matter. Even seemingly small sources of pollution can have a big impact on water quality. For example, bacteria in shellfish beds in Buttermilk Bay near Cape Cod were traced to dog feces washed there from surrounding yards by rainstorms. Pollution from boats and marinas includes litter, fish waste, sewage, fuels and lubricants, contaminated bilge water, boatmaintenance products, and storm water runoff.

Each boat and marina may represent only a tiny fraction of the total, but 94 million of us boat and/or fish each year, and there are more than 10,000 U.S. marinas and millions of boats.

Pollution can affect boaters by contact, ingestion, and by biological accumulation in the fish that we catch and eat. About one-half of fecal mass is potentially virulent bacteria. In addition, scientists have measured detectable quantities of caffeine and pharmaceuticals in the Nation's waters.

Our future success or failure in reducing nonpoint pollution is up to you. It will be controlled only when individuals change old habits and make the extra effort to properly dispose of waste. Boaters in particular, as primary beneficiaries of clean waters, are morally and legally responsible for their actions on the water, at the dock, in the marina, and at home. In addition to educating themselves in clean boating and improving their own practices, they should share information with others, including legislators. They can improve water quality by factoring it into such decisions as selecting a marina, performing boat maintenance, and buying equipment and supplies.

Free information on boating and the environment is available from the Coast Guard, the EPA, NOAA, state and local governments, as well as many private companies and organizations, including the ABA.
